SciencesPo. SCIENCES PO AT A GLANCE

Founded in 1872, Sciences Po was originally a private school established to analyze the contemporary world and prepare young people to enter public administration in France.

Today, Sciences Po functions as a top-level research university in the social sciences, offering a wide and varied curriculum and drawing on academics and experts in such fields as political science, international relations, sociology, law, and economics. Scholars as well as professionals from the business world and public administration comprise Sciences Po's distinguished faculty.

Located in the heart of Paris, Sciences Po is a symbol of excellence and attracts outstanding students from all over the world. With more than 300 partner universities worldwide and 30% of international students, Sciences Po has become a truly international institution.

Innovation and creativity in research and education have always been a driving force at Sciences Po. Through its multidisciplinary programs, Sciences Po delivers a solid methodological training and provides students with the tools to deal with complexity. Besides, Sciences Po's education constantly encourages bold intellectual attitudes and mutual respect and consideration.

Among the 13 professional Master's programs, the Master of International Affairs gathers a very diverse student body, in terms of academic as well as cultural backgrounds, with more than 50% international students.

The Master offers several dual degree programs in international affairs with prestigious academic partners such as SIPA-Columbia (NYC, USA), the LSE (London, UK), the Bocconi (Milan, Italy), MGIMO (Moscow, Russia).



SIPA AT A GLANCE

The world's most global public policy school, Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs provides its students with the skills and knowledge to pursue distinguished careers in government, business, media, non-profit organizations, NGOs, and international organizations.

Its faculty, students, and alumni are committed to enhancing the public good—providing social services, supporting human rights, building markets, protecting the environment, and resolving conflicts.

SIPA students are an extraordinary group from a variety of backgrounds, who are united by their energy, enthusiasm, and dedication to making a difference in the world. Today half of SIPA's nearly 1,200 students are international, coming from around one hundred countries.

They are enrolled either in one of the traditional two-year programs, or in one of several other programs, such as dual degree programs with international schools, including the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) and the Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris (Sciences Po).

From Wall Street to Harlem, from City Hall to the United Nations, and from environmental science to Latin American studies, SIPA continues to build on and contribute to the policies and practices that shape global communities.

A HIGH STANDARD PROGRAM IN INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

Sciences Po and Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA) share the conviction that the best education for future policy experts and senior decision-makers in international affairs is the product of the combination of a solid multidisciplinary base in the social sciences and an in-depth specialization.

Building on the complementary approaches of two prestigious institutions with rich and diverse academic traditions, Sciences Po and SIPA, both members of the Association of Professional Schools of International Affairs (APSIA), decided in 2000 to combine their strengths and offer a dual Master's degree program in International Affairs.

Since 2000, more than 100 students have graduated from the Sciences Po/SIPA dual degree in International Affairs. Dual degree alumni are currently working in Paris, New York, London, Geneva, Copenhagen, Pristina or Sao Paulo, within institutions as varied as Goldman Sachs, the World Bank, Doctors without Borders, the European Commission, Air France or Bloomberg LP.

In 2008, SIPA and Sciences Po launched a redesigned Dual Master's degree program in International Affairs open to all candidates worldwide.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Dual Master's degree program in International Affairs is a two-year full time Master's Program, taught in both French and English. Spanning a wide range of disciplines, this program offers core courses in international relations, economics, and management and a large number of concentrations.

The curriculum blends international relations expertise and professional skills courses. It is designed to offer advanced education in the area of international affairs and to give students the opportunity to develop a top-level career in the private, public or non-profit sectors.

The Dual Master's degree program in International Affairs is a highly selective program: between 15 and 20 students will be selected each year from applicants worldwide. All students will spend their first year at Sciences Po, and their second year at SIPA. After two years of study, and provided credits have been completed in both institutions, students will receive Master's degrees from both Sciences Po and SIPA.

The faculty involved in this program is comprised of internationally renowned academics and practitioners. By joining both the Columbia and Sciences Po communities, dual degree students will be able to benefit from the exceptionally stimulating intellectual environment of both institutions during the duration of the program, and as alumni, and to extend their networks and opportunities to both sides of the Atlantic.

They will be able to benefit from all resources and services (libraries, events, career services etc.) of both institutions during the full time of the program.

YEAR 1 AT SCIENCES PO

During the first year of the dual degree, students join one of the following tracks, in either the Master's in International Affairs (MIA) or the Master's in Finance and Strategy (MFS):

- Politique économique internationale (MIA)
- Environnement, développement durable et risques (MIA)
- Sécurité internationale (MIA)
- Management public international (MIA)
- International Business (MFS)

Core courses

1. Pre-Requisites for the dual degree

Students with sufficient background in economics HAVE TO take either "Guerre et paix" or "Sociologie des relations internationales" AND "Economie" over their year at Sciences Po (one class each semester).

Students with no background in economics HAVE TO take "Initiation à l'économie" AND "Guerre et paix" or "Sociologie des relations internationales" during the first semester, AND "Economie" during the second semester.

ALL students will have to take "Méthodes quantitatives".

Languages

All students (except native speakers and students coming from a French or English-speaking higher education institution) must take a language test in French and/or English at Sciences Po. If they do not reach the required level in French and/or English, they must take an advanced French and/or an English class at Sciences Po. They also have the option to take a foreign language class other than French or English.

Assessment

Students will have to complete at least 50 ECTS credits during their year at Sciences Po. Students who will not complete the required number of credits over the year will be asked to take extra courses in order to fulfil credit requirements.

Degree

Students will receive Sciences Po's Master's degree in international affairs or finance and strategy

after completing their two years of studies and all requirements at the two institutions. A specific concentration can appear on their Master's degree according to the courses completed at SIPA.

Academic calendar

The 2009-2010 academic calendar at Sciences Po runs from mid-September to mid-January (fall semester) and from end of January to early June (spring semester), corresponding to two 12-week semesters. Dual degree students may attend the "Orientation Program" at Sciences Po before the beginning of courses.

YEAR 2 AT SIPA

Policy Concentrations

All students choose **one** concentration consisting of 5 courses: a policy field in which they wish to focus their studies at SIPA.

Core curriculum

Students have to complete all requirements of the core curriculum of the MIA in addition to the core requirements of the Sciences Po MIA. Most of these requirements will be satisfied through courses taken during their first year of study at Sciences Po.

Courses and electives

Students have to choose courses and electives in order to complete their chosen concentration. Students should be aware that most SIPA concentrations have prerequisites that should be completed during the first year at Sciences Po. Students who do not complete the concentration prerequisites

during the first year will have a difficult time fulfilling all requirements for a concentration in their second year. Students can enrol in a limited number of classes in all Columbia departments, including the Business and Law schools and the School of Public Health.

Foreign languages

All dual degree students automatically meet their language proficiency requirement by their admission into the program. Any language courses taken at the intermediate level can count as electives.

Assessment

Students must successfully complete a minimum of 30 credits during their year at SIPA. Students failing to complete the number of credits and other requirements will be asked to take extra courses to fulfil their requirements by remaining an extra semester at Columbia.

Degree

Students will receive the Master's degree in International Affairs from SIPA after completing their two years of studies and all their requirements at the two institutions.

Academic calendar

HOW TO APPLY

ELIGIBILITY

Each year, between 15 to 20 students will be selected worldwide to be part of the SIPA/Sciences Po MIA dual degree. Applicants do not have to be enrolled at SIPA or at Sciences Po to apply to the dual degree program.

Applicants need to:

- Hold an undergraduate diploma, irrespective of their area of studies, university or country of origin.
- Demonstrate an excellent proficiency in French and in English.

ALL selected applicants will spend their first academic year at Sciences Po (2010-2011) and their second academic year at SIPA (2011-2012).

This application is specific to the dual degree program and is not transferable to other programs at either institution. Students who wish to be considered for admission to other SIPA or Sciences Po programs must fulfil all relevant application requirements for those programs.

Successful applicants will be notified by email and mail.

For non native speakers:

-Level 5 at the TCF (500 points) or DALF (C1 or C2) for French. Students must take one of these tests for their application to the dual degree, or provide a French *Baccalauréat*.

If you have been educated in a French speaking high school, you must attach a copy of your high school diploma. List of states considered French speaking : Andorre, Belgique, Bénin, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroun, Canada (francophone : Québec), Centrafrique, Congo, Côte d'Ivoire, Gabon, Guinée, Luxembourg, Mali, Monaco, Niger, Sainte Lucie, Sénégal, Suisse francophone, Tchad, Togo.

-TOEFL IBT 100 or IELTS 7, or any other diploma demonstrating an excellent proficiency in English.

- Students applying for this dual degree program typically have prior professional experience (jobs or internships), an academic background in economics and/or social sciences, and quantitative skills.

Online admissions open in October. All application materials must be submitted online by **February 2nd 2010**. Applications will be reviewed by a joint Admissions Board comprised of representatives from SIPA and Sciences Po.

COST OF ATTENDANCE AND FINANCIAL AID

TUITION AND FEES

Students must pay the tuition fees applicable in their host institution (Sciences Po for Year 1 and SIPA for Year 2). Here is a tentative budget for the two years of the program.

Year 1: Tuition, fees and living costs

Tuition and fees at Sciences Po in 2009-2010 (€)

- MIA tuition
 - For students whose tax residence is in the European Union: from 0 to 12 000 € (depending on total declared income)
 - For students whose tax residence is not in the European Union: 12 000 €

- Social security (mandatory for students between 20-28 years old): 195 €
- Mandatory medical examination for students registering for the first time in a French higher education institution: 4 €
- It is recommended for students to get extra insurance coverage (*mutuelle*): 300 €

= Total tuition and fees (maximum): 12 499 €

Living cost in Paris in 2009-2010

- Rent: (600 €/month x 9) including utilities: 5 400 €
- Food: (200€/month x 9): 1 800 €
- Local Transportation (50/month x 9): 450 €
- International Flight: 800 €
- Personal Expenses (150/month x 9): 1 350 €

= Total living cost: 9 800 €

FINANCIAL AID

Dual degree students are eligible to the same financial aid as other students in the institution where they are enrolled (at Sciences Po for Year 1 and at SIPA for Year 2).

However, financial aid at Sciences Po and SIPA is limited and WILL NOT cover the total cost of the dual degree program. Students are therefore strongly encouraged to also look for external grants and fellowships.

Year 1: Financial aid at Sciences Po

Students are eligible for the same financial aid as other Sciences Po students during Year 1. Sciences Po offers a wide range of merit-based and need-based scholarships to French, EU and international students.

Important information about student loans

In order to apply for student loans, students have a variety of options: French citizens are eligible for French-based loans; US citizens may take out American federal loans from either SIPA or Sciences Po but not both; international students may take out private loans by contacting SIPA financial aid.
